KEYSTONE BEDFORD COUNTY CRUISE – AUGUST 22!

Ever hear of Mother Bedford? It's the name given by genealogists to Bedford County, PA. When formed in 1771, it contained a massive area extending from the Blue Mountains to the Ohio River and the descendants of that area's first colonists went on to populate much of pre-Civil War USA with access to the Ohio River valley.

On August 22, the Keystone Porsche Club will be having lunch in one of the county's oldest structures, the Jean Bonnet Tavern built in 1762. To get there, we'll travel from Claysburg through Blue Knob State Park, visit the Fish Culture Station at Reynoldsdale, check out products at a commercial apple orchard, experience



vistas from halfway up the Allegheny Front, and cruise along traces of two 18th century military roads cut through the dense wilderness by British armies. Forbes' Road (1758), will take us past a two centuries old log church as well as Shawnee State Park, and Burd's Road (1755) will lead us to the Jean Bonnet Tavern. Altogether we'll travel through sixty miles of scenic Bedford County terrain, of which more than 90% is devoted to agriculture, pasture or forest products. Our tour starts at the Claysburg Sheetz just off I-99's Exit 15. The address is: 12604 Dunnings Hwy, Claysburg, PA 16625. Registration starts at 9:30 am and the tour begins at 10:00. We expect to arrive at the Jean Bonnet Tavern about 12:30 pm for lunch. Its address is 6048 Lincoln Highway - Bedford, PA 15522. The tavern is four miles from the I-99 Bedford interchange and your return trip.




OK I think that's about it. See you on the 22nd and don't forget: PCA's not just about the cars, it's about the people.
